Security Volunteer Project

designed and financed by the Ministry of the Interior (MoI) since 2014

methodology since 2016

the **goals** are:

to encourage greater **involvement of the public in local policing**

to inspire municipalities and their residents to **develop volunteer activities**

- to respond to the **initiatives of civil society** (among others former police officers or soldiers)
- to contribute to the **improvement of the quality of life** in municipalities





Who is the security volunteer?

a person living in the municipality a **well-informed** and trained citizen has local knowledge, informal authority, and is a role model performs the role – **voluntarily**, in their free time, without remuneration focused on prevention, not represion strong communicator does not replace the police







Examples of Activities

- **road safety** ensuring safe crossings, informing drivers, and assisting in traffic control in cases of temporary restrictions (sport, cultural events etc.)
- organising informative meetings between the citizens and the authorities about public
 - safety and risks
- helping with preventive activities and campaigns
- external inspections of houses and flats
 - when occupants are away
- patrolling in gardening colonies and
 - houses areas

to public facilities

- creating a network of people to be available
 - to help search for missing persons
- mapping and reporting illegal waste sites, car wrecks, damaged or missing road signs, and damage







What are the legal restrictions?

They are volunteers, not official persons, not employees of the municipality, not authorized with any special powers of the public authority

They can

a)act within the limits of the rights

given to all citizens

b)notify the authorities about lawbreaking

and/or call the police

c)stop vehicles to ensure safe crossings

d)patrol in the municipality

e)detain offenders on the spot where a crime was

committed, if necessary (self-defense)

f)prevent a crime, an offence or the causing of

other harms (necessity)

They cannot

a)request a proof of identity

b)request an explanation

c)carry out a body search

d)enter residential or non-residential

premises without permission

e)evict persons from premises

f)order persons to remain on spot







Organising the Work of the Volunteers

the municipality is responsible for the volunteers and coordinating and managing the project there should be a designated project manager to execute, manage, administer, monitor and evaluate to manage communications between the stakeholders for more than 5 volunteers also **a coordinator** to lead and organise the volunteers to report to the manager to mentor and motivate volunteers








Financial Support of the Mol

it is possible to apply for **a grant** from the MoI to cover:

- insurance for liability
- the costs of registering and training the volunteers
- material equipment
- informational and promotional materials
- the organisation of meetings with the citizens
- fees for an issue from the Criminal Records Office



one-year, possibility of repeating, no need for co-financing





Contracts

no employment contract, no financial remuneration, no special authorizations

avoid confusion with the Police and other official authorities

the municipality can have **a civil contract** with the volunteers containing:

type of activity to be performed and how

place and time of the activity

the duration of the contract

training of the volunteer

certificate of the volunteer's performance

instruction on the associated risks

liability for damages and insurance obligations







Recommendations for Engaging the Public

- 1. reach out to volunteers directly
- 2. use social events in the municipality
- 3. actively present the needs of the community and the activities of the volunteers
- 4. use media: press, radio, television, internet, social networks
- 5. highlight that volunteers do not replace the police

Active volunteers can be approached directly through their parent associations (e.g. cooperation with volunteer fire-fighters, veterans associations etc.) – not competition, but cooperation.







Recommendations for Choosing the Volunteers

- 1. require an issue from the Criminal Records Office
- 2. avoid applicants known to be regular and heavy users of alcohol or other addictive substances
- 3. avoid applicants with a bad reputation
- 4. establish basic health requirements for different activities
- 5. keep the priorities and specific needs of the municipality in mind
- 6. focus on candidates' abilities and motivation, time availability, and their relationship to the security forces
- 7. diverse teams work better







The Volunteer Training

simple, informal, and continuous

based on the specific activities they will be performing engaging the Police department or veterans the goals are:

- to motivate the volunteers
- to clarify the requirements and activities to be carried out
- to highlight the legal regulation and boundaries
- to **prepare** the volunteers **and reinforce** appropriate
 - and required basic skills
- to minimise failings









Municipal Monitoring and Evaluation

the project manager should monitor and evaluate the work of

the volunteers periodically

focus on prevention, continuous oversight, and benefits, cooperation with the citizens evaluate the project outcomes and success set the evaluation criteria individually for each activity collect and share examples of good practices the volunteers can be motivated through symbolic rewards







Stříbro

small city in the West of Bohemia 8 145 inhabitants founded in the 12th century mining history foreign workers











Security Volunteers in Stříbro

project realisation **2016 – 2024**

24 long-term, 52 short-term, and hundreds of occasional volunteers maintaining public order in their communities
interested in helping others, professionally trained, and materially equipped
experience and skills in the field of internal security on the local level since 2022 involvement of Ukrainian refugees – 9 long-term volunteers









"The Stříbro City Security Volunteer project has brought together dozens of brave women and men who, in their free time, have stepped out of anonymity and are dedicated to crime prevention and increasing the feeling of security of their neighbours and visitors to the city."







Activities of Stříbro volunteers

- 1. informational meetings with different age groups of the city's inhabitants
- 2. checking houses, cottages in recreational areas, and the security of parked vehicles
- 3. clearing of illegal waste sites
- 4. ensuring safe crossings of school children
- 5. supervising the course of cultural, social, and sports events
- 6. supporting the implementation of the crisis measures during Covid-19
- 7. helping with the adaptation and integration of war refugees from Ukraine















Supporting Ukrainian refugees

using the project to help with the **adaptation and integration** of war refugees from Ukraine **involving** refugees and foreigners **in public matters** as volunteers becoming ambassadors in their own community providing the much-needed information about the history and life in their place of residence creating a sense of community and safety resulting in greater certainty, less fear, less anxiety of children, and generally more trust in local citizens and local self-government







Costs and financing

an annual budget of 70.000 - 80.000 CZK (i.e. approximately

2.800 – 3.200 €)

covered by **a grant from the Mol** the municipality guarantees financing of any additional costs









Evaluation

based on a quantitative and qualitative data collection increase in public feelings of security improvement of tolerance between different communities reduction of risks of conflict escalations strenghtening of bonds within the municipality increased safety at pedestrian crossings improved communication between the municipality and the public personal and professional development of the volunteers
